PRIORITIZE EQUITY IN RECOVERY EFFORTS

Equitable recovery works across sectors to place Black and Brown communities, seniors, and children at the center.



FUND EMERGENCY HOUSING SUPPORT

Ensure low-income residents can remain in their homes during the COVID-19 pandemic, lives depend on it.



CANCEL RENT AND EVICTIONS

Canceling rent ensures residents will continue to have a place to safely isolate in the case of infection.



STRENGTHEN HOUSING POLICIES AND PROGRAMS

Improve access to affordable housing by expanding policies that work like the federal Low-Income Housing Tax Credit.

- The Federal Ministry of the Interior, Building and Home Affairs (BMI) is funding 13 pilot projects as part of the national urban development policy, which, in view of the Covid-19 pandemic, are to test innovative and exemplary solutions for "crisisproof urban and neighborhood structures".
- For the projects selected, a total of 3.5 million euros are available until 2023.
- A total of 222 applications were received from municipalities, associations, initiatives, companies and other stakeholders..
- Actors from politics, city administration, business and civil society work together in the projects.






Planning objectives:

- Green courtyard
- Public hall and café
- Incubator for new initiatives
- Hose tower as a landmark
- On-site workplaces
- Kindergarten in the neighborhood
- Living space for all generations

By expanding the existing apartments and adding storeys to the vehicle hall and administrative buildings, modern, affordable and needs-based rental apartments with a cooperative architecture are being created on an area of 1,770 m². In cooperation with the Lebenshilfe-Werk, it will set up apartments suitable for the disabled. In the future, around 70 people will live in the old fire station.







A participatory approach:

1. Rental space for every budget

Rent an office or event space in the Alte Feuerwache. Families with many children or elderly people, start-ups or clubs in particular should find affordable space in the old fire station. We can only do this with your support.

2. Spread over many shoulders

We want to distribute the financial burden over as many hundred shoulders as possible. In addition to us, the association members themselves, friends and family members, people from the neighborhood and sympathizers, but also companies and institutions of the "Alte Feuerwache Weimar Projekt GmbH" give private subordinate loans in small and large amounts.

3. Germany-wide support

So far, over 135 people have supported our citizens' initiative with a direct loan and thus co-financed the purchase of the old fire station in September 2019 and the renovation planning to this day. Just half of the direct loans came from Weimar.

4. Social, regional values

It secures 3,000 m² of permanently affordable rental space for living and working, culture and sport.


